CD One

Dia Dhuit. My name is Liam O'Maoinlai and I want to welcome you to the Irish Independent and Sunday Independent's Irish language CD course. There are no books required for this course. Simply sit back and prepare to learn, or relearn, a range of Irish-language expressions that you can then use in your everyday life.

The featured words and phrases are easy to learn, and the full course is spread over 2 CDs, each featuring 6 lessons lasting approximately ten minute each. I will speak the phrase in English and then I'll say the same thing in Irish. After that, there'll be a pause for you to practice saying the words in Irish yourself. I will then go on to the next phrase.

So let's begin...

Lesson One: Introducing yourself

There are a number of ways of greeting someone in Irish.

When someone says "Dia dhuit", you reply, "Dia is muire dhuit." Now, you try it.

You can also say any of the following. Listen and repeat.

Hello
Dia dhuit

Please let me introduce myself
Lig dom mé féin a chur in aithne

My name is Peadar
Peadar is ainm dom

Hi, my name is Seán
Hi, Seán is ainm dom

It's a pleasure to meet you.
Tá sé deas bualadh leat

How are you?
Conas tá tú?

I'm fine – and you?
Tá mé go breá – agus tú féin?

Good, thank you.
Go maith, go raibh maith agat

I'm from Dublin.
Is as Baile Átha Cliath domsa

I'm from Donegal.
Is as Dún na nGall dom.

You're from Kerry? Whereabouts?
Is as Ciarraí duit? Cén áit?

Kerry is a beautiful place.
Tá Ciarraí go hálainn.

Now, listen to these phrases again.
<note Irish only, followed by a pause>

Hello, please let me introduce myself; my name is Seán. It's a pleasure to meet you. I'm from Dublin. Are you from Kerry. Kerry is a beautiful place.

Dia dhuit, lig dom mé féin a chur in aithne, Seán is ainm dom.
Tá sé deas bualadh leat.
Is as Baile átha Cliath dom. An as Ciarraí duit? Tá Ciarraí go hálainn.

Now listen and then repeat these phrases around leave taking.

Well, nice to meet you.
Bhuel, deas bualadh leat

Goodbye.
Slán

See you.
Feicfidh mé thú

Bye for now.
Slán go fóill

Now try putting two of the phrases together to close off an encounter:
<note Irish only, followed by a pause>

Well, nice to meet you. Goodbye.
Bhuel, deas bualadh leat, slán

Now trying to put a couple of sentences together yourself. Try saying:

"Hello, I'm Peadar from Donegal. I'm pleased to meet you."

<Note pause for student to attempt the phrases.>

OK, Hopefully you said something like:

<Note Repeat the phrase in Irish this time.>

"Is mise Peadar ó Dhún na nGall. Tá sé deas bualadh leat."
And that brings us to the end of our first lesson. You might want to review it until you become familiar with the contents.

Lesson Two: Asking for Help

In this lesson we will look at getting information from others. There are a number of ways to approach people. Listen and repeat.

Excuse me
Gabh mo leithscéal

Hi. Can you help me?
Hi. An féidir leat cabhrú liom?

Where is?
Cá bhfuil...?

Please.
Le do thoil

Thank you.
Go raibh maith agat

I'm looking for the Post Office
Táim ag lorg Oifig an Phoist

Now, we will put those phrases into complete sentences. Listen and repeat.

Excuse me. Hi! Can you help me please?
Where is the post office? Thank you.

Gabh mo leithscéal. Hi. An féidir leat cabhrú liom le do thoil?
Cá bhfuil Oifig an Phoist? Go raibh maith agat

Good. Some more phrases. Listen and repeat

What is the way to...?
Cén slí chuig... / Cén treo ina bhfuil...

Can you give me directions to...?
An féidir leat treoracha a thabhairt dom chuig

I am looking for...

Now we'll join these up into longer sentences. Listen and repeat.

What is the way to the beach?
Cén treo chuig an trá?

Can you give me directions to the Main Street.

Táim ag lorg na siopaí

Now try some more sentences. Again, listen and repeat.

The shops are on the Main Street
Tá na siopaí ar an bpríomhshráid

The post office is opposite the shops
Tá oifig an phoist os comhair na siopaí

The beach is the first left after the shops
Tá an trá ar chlé díreach taréis na siopaí

Take the next right for the Main Street
Tóg an chéad chasadh eile ar dheis le dul go dtí an Phríomhshráid

Now listen to the next sentence in English and then attempt to say it in Irish yourself.

Hi. Can you help me? I am looking for the beach. Is it the next left after the Post Office? Oh. The first right on the Main Street. Thank you.

<note pause for student attempt.>

Ok. It goes like this:

Hi. An féidir leat cabhrú liom? Táim ag lorg na trá. An bhfuil sí ar chlé tar éis Oifig an Phoist? Oh, an chéad chasadh ar dheis ar an bPríomhshráid. Go raibh maith agat.

<note repeat phrase in Irish.>

Now try it again yourself.
Now we'll look at more examples of seeking help. Listen and repeat.

Excuse me. I need some help.
Gabh mo leithscéal, tá cúnamh uaim

How can I help you?
Conas gur féidir liom cabhrú leat/

I'm looking for the Seaview B and B
Táim ag lorg B&B an Seaview.

Do you know the address?
An bhfuil an seoladh agat?

Yes. It's in the townland of Conlin.
Tá. Tá sé i mbaile fearainn Conlin

OK, I know it now. You need to go back the way you came.
Ok, Tá sé agam anois. Caithfidh tú dul ar ais an tslí a tháinig tú

Right.
Ceart go leor

Then take the second left after de Rossa's pub.
Tóg an dara casadh ar chlé tar éis teach tabhairne de Rossa

Yes.
Sea

And you'll see it on your right, 200 metres later.
Agus feicfidh tú é ar dheis, dhá chéad méadar ar aghaidh

That's great. Thank you very much.
Sin iontach. Go raibh míle maith agat

And if we join some of the phrases up. Listen and repeat.

The Seaview B and B is in the townland of Conlin. To get there, you take the second left after de Rossa's pub and, after 200 metres, you'll see it on your right.

Tá B&B an Seaview i mbaile fearainn Conlin. Le dul ann, tóg an dara casadh ar chlé tar éis teach tabhairne de Rossa agus dhá chéad méadar ina dhiaidh sin, feicfidh tu ar dheis é.

Now we will look at correcting misunderstandings! Listen and repeat.

Asking the time. Listen and repeat.

Excuse me. What time is it?
Gabh mo leithscéal, cén t-am é?

It is two-thirty
Tá sé leathuair tar éis a dó

What time do the shops open?
Cén t-am a osclaíonn na siopaí

The shops open at nine o'clock.
Osclaíonn na siopaí ag a naoi a chlog

When does the bar close?
Cathain a dhúnann an béar?

The bar closes at midnight.
Dúnann an béar ag meán oíche

Lesson Three: Weather

This is one of our favourite topics in Ireland, so as before, listen and repeat.

It is hot.
Tá sé te

It is sunny.
Tá sé grianmhar

The sky is blue.
Tá an spéir gorm

It is 25 degrees today
Tá an teocht ag fiche cúig céim inniu

It's a fine day.
Lá breá

It's hot and sunny and the sky is blue today.
Tá sé te agus grianmhar agus tá an spéir gorm inniu

Now on to not so good weather. Listen and repeat.

It is cold.
Tá sé fuar

It is cloudy.
Tá se scamallach

The sky is grey.
Tá an spéir liath

There is a strong breeze.
Tá gaoth láidir ann

The weather is terrible.
Tá an aimsir uafásach

It's cold and grey today with a strong breeze.
Tá sé fuar inniu, agus tá an ghaoth láidir

Now, listen to these phrases and repeat.
<note Irish only, followed by a pause>

The sky is blue and it's 25 degrees today.
Tá an spéir gorm agus tá an teocht ag fiche cúig céim inniu
It's cloudy with a strong breeze today.
Tá sé scamallach agus tá gaoth láidir ann inniu

Now try saying, "Today is cold and cloudy."

<note pause for student and then repeat in Irish.>

Tá sé fuar agus scamallach inniu

Good. Now what about, "it's hot and the sky is blue."

<note pause for student and then repeat in Irish.>

Tá sé te agus tá an spéir gorm

Oh, Oh. Here comes the rain! OK, as always, listen and repeat.

It is drizzling.

It's pouring rain.
Tá sé ag stealladh báistí

There are hailstones.
Tá clocha sneachta ann

It will snow tonight.
Tá sneachta air anocht

What is the forecast?
Cad é tuar na haimsire?

There are hailstones and it will snow later.
Tá clocha sneachta ann agus beidh sé ag cur sneachta níos déanaí

Is rain forecast for tonight?
Bhfuil básiteach geallta anocht?

Now try saying, "it's drizzling rain tonight."

<note pause for student and then repeat in Irish.>
Tá salachar báistí ann anocht

Now the weather in the different seasons

In spring, you get sun and showers.
San earrach bíonn idir ghrian agus cheathanna againn

In summer, you get long sunny days.
Sa Samhradh, bíonn laethanta fada griamhara againn

In autumn, strong winds blow the leaves off the trees.
San Fhómhar, séideann gaoth láidir na duilleoga de na crainnte

In winter it rains a lot.
Sa Gheimhreadh, bíonn sé ag cur báistí go minic

Sometimes we get snow and ice.
Uaireanta bíonn sioc agus sneachta again

Can you say, "In autumn, you get strong winds." in Irish?

<note pause for student and then repeat in Irish.>

San Fhómhar, bíonn gaoth láidir againn

Lesson Four: Holidays

If you holiday on the West coast, you may well find that you are in an Irish-speaking area. Don't be afraid to try your Irish out on them! First let's look at activities centred around the beach. Listen and repeat.

Sean wants to go fishing.
Teastaíonn ó Sheán dul ag iascaireacht

We wish to hire a boat.
Ba mhaith linn bád a fháil ar cíós

Is this beach safe for swimming?
An bhfuil sé sábháilte dul ag snámh ar an trá seo

Are jet skis permitted on this beach?
An bhfuil jet skis ceadaithe ar an trá seo?

This is a blue flag beach.
Tá brat gorm ag an trá seo

There are two lifeguards on duty.
Tá beirt gharda slándála ar dualgas

The tide is coming in.
Tá an taoide ag Líonadh

The tide is out.
Tá an taoide tráite

The kids love the sandy beach.
Is breá leis na páistí trá deas gaineamhach

Putting some of these together, we get:

[The kids love the blue flag sandy beach.]
Is breá leis na páistí an trá ghaineamhach leis an mbrat gorm

There are no jetskis permitted so instead we hired a boat.
Níl jetskis ceadaithe ar an trá, agus thóg muid bád ar cíós in ionad

This beach is safe for swimming – there is a lifeguard on duty.
Tá sé sábháilte snámh ag an trá seo – tá beirt ghard slándála ar dualgas

Now try saying "There are no boats permitted on the Blue Flag Beach"

<note pause for student and then repeat in Irish.>

Níl cead aon bhád a bheith ar an trá leis an mbrat gorm

Now try saying, "This sandy beach is safe for the kids to go swimming."

<note pause for student and then repeat in Irish.>

Tá an trá ghaineamhach sábháilte do na páistí le dul ag snámh

Now, we will consider other types of outdoor activities. Listen and repeat.

We love hiking up the mountains is breá linn dul ag siúl sna sléibhte

Is there a golf course near-by? An bhfuil galfchursa in aice láimhe

Let's go horse-riding. Téanaim ag marcaíocht

Is it safe to cycle on these roads? An bhfuil sé sábháilte dul ag rotháíocht ar na bóithre seo

We want to play tennis this morning. Teastaíonn uainn leadóg a imirt ar maidin

We will watch the match tomorrow afternoon. Féachfaimid ar an gcluiche trathnóna amárach

Is there a market day in the town? An bhfuil aon lá mhargaidh ar an mbaile?

What are the sights worth visiting? Cad iad na háiteanna ar chóir duinn cuairt a thabhairt orthu?

Is there a charge into the Gardens? An bhfuil táille le híoc ag dul isteach sna gáirdíní?

Now try these longer phrases
<note speak them in Irish only followed by a pause for the student to attempt them.>

We want to play tennis this morning and cycle into town this afternoon.

Lesson Five: Food

Ordering food is a perfect opportunity to practice your Irish, so listen and repeat:

I am hungry
Tá ocras orm

We are hungry
Tá ocras orainn

The children are hungry
Tá ocras ar na páistí

Breakfast is at eight.
Beidh an bricfeasta ag a hocht

Let's meet for lunch.
Buailfimis le chéile don lón

We eat dinner in the evening
Ithimid an dinnéar tráthnóna

I am hungry, let's meet for lunch.
Tá ocras orm, buailfimis le chéile don lón

Now, listen to these phrases and repeat.
<note Irish only, followed by a pause>

We eat dinner in the evening when the children are hungry.
Ithimid an dinnéar tráthnóna nuair atá ocras ar na páistí

Let's meet for breakfast.

Now try saying: "I am hungry, let's meet for dinner."
< pause for the student to answer followed by the phrase in Irish.>

Now we'll consider some things to eat and drink. Listen and repeat.

He had toast every morning.

I prefer coffee to tea.

We have a snack at eleven in the morning.

Would you like to come to dinner?

We are having a dinner party on Saturday.
Beidh cóisir dinnéir againn ar an Satharn

I am inviting six guests.
Tá cuireadh tugtha agam do sheisear

We need caterers to help.
Tá lónadóirí ag teastáil chun cúnamh a thabhairt

The guests arrive at eight
Tiocfaidh na haíonna ag a hocht

And combining some of these phrases:

We need caterers to help with our dinner party.
Tá lonadóirí ag teastáil chun cúnamh a thabhairt leis an gcóisir dinnéir

I am inviting six guests to dinner on Saturday.
Tá cuireadh tugtha agam do sheisear teacht chuig dinnéir ar an Satharn

Now try saying, "We are having a dinner party."

<note pause for student and then repeat in Irish.>

Táimid chun cóisir dinnéir a bheith againn
Now can you say, "Would you like to come to dinner on Saturday?"

<note pause for student and then repeat in Irish.>

Ar mhaith leat teacht chun dinnéir Dé Sathairn?

Lesson Six: Drink

Once again, this is a great opportunity to use your Irish, so repeat after me...

Would you like a drink?
Ar mhaith leat deoch?

Do you drink tea?
An ólann tú tae/

Would you like a cup of coffee?
Ar mhaith leat cupán caifé?

Have you got decaffeinated coffee?
An bhfuil caife gan caiféin agat?

I like tap water with ice.
Is maith liom uisce ón sconna le leac oighir

The kids love lemonade.
Is breá leis na páistí liomanáid

Fruit juice is best for children.
Sú tortha is fearr do na páistí

Now, listen to these phrases and repeat.

<Note these in Irish only, followed by pause for student to repeat.>

I would like a glass of lemonade with ice please.
Ba mhaith liom gloine liomanáide le leac oighir le do thoil

Would you like a cup of tea?
Ar mhaith leat cupán tae?

Now try saying, "I would like a coffee please."

<note pause for student and then repeat in Irish.>

Ba mhaith liom caifé le do thoil

Now listen to these phrases and repeat.

I am thirsty
Tá tart orm

Spring water is good for you.
Tá fíoruisce go maith duit

I would like a pint of milk.
Ba mhaith liom pionta bainne a bheith agam

Would you like some wine?
Ar mhaith leat braon fíona

Red or white?
Dearg nó geal/

This wine is very good.
Tá an fíon seo thar barr

Now, listen to these phrases and repeat.

<Note these in Irish only, followed by pause for student to re-

peat.>

Milk is good for you.

<note pause for student and then repeat in Irish.>

Now, listen to these phrases and repeat.

<Note these in Irish only, followed by pause for student to repeat.>

Can I have two whiskeys and a gin and tonic please.
